20th Annual Spring Clean Up

As winter's blanket of snow lifted this spring there was the usual scattering of litter left behind. As has happened



for 20 years now, the people of this neighbourhood came together to clean up the debris left behind, creating a fresh start for the spring. On Saturday April 23rd, 2016 SNA hosted the 20th Annual West End Spring Clean Up along with DMSMCA. The event was a great success with over 50 volunteers! The day was filled with great energy, smiles, and lots of laughter as we filled up the garbage bin that was generously donated by Johnson Waste Management. Volunteers worked to clean the neighbourhood's streets and back-lanes of litter and bulky waste. Bulky waste includes mattresses and couches that have been illegally dumped in back-lanes creating fire hazards; litter on the boulevards and streets keeps the grass and gardens from growing. At the clean-up there was also a collection for E-Waste which is electronic waste. This means things like T.V.s, computers, microwaves, and phones. E-Waste cannot be thrown away in regular garbage because it contains heavy metals and needs special treatment. At other times of the year E-Waste can be disposed of at depots and drop-off locations. By cleaning these things up in our neighbourhood we make sure it stays safe and nurturing for the community.

We would like to thank the Starbucks at 1430 Ellice Ave for donating coffee for everyone before clean-up. A big thanks also goes to Youth Crew for preparing a great meal of tacos for all participants! Raffle prizes were donated by Kristen Wiltshire, Sobeys, Garbonzo's, Feast Café, and Waterfront Massage Therapy. The biggest thank-you goes to those who volunteered to help clean up the neighbourhood. It is a moment to be very proud of when so many people come together to look after the spaces we live, work, and play in.

Residential Tenancies Branch staff will be visiting Spence Neighbourhood Association



Starting in May, the RTB will have a staff member come out to the SNA's Tenant's Committee Meeting each month. At each meeting, we will be talking about an issue important to tenants. Tenants will have the chance to ask questions and see how forms and other documents need to be filled out.

On the Tuesday after the Tenant's Committee Meeting, an RTB staff member will be available at SNA (Ellice location) to meet privately with tenants, go over paperwork and forms, and answer questions specific to their tenancy.

At the May meeting, staff will talk about **Tenancy Agreements** and **Condition Reports**. We will go over different types of tenancy agreements, what your responsibilities are once you sign one, how to fill out a condition report, and what you should do if your landlord won't to do a condition report with you.

If after the meeting you wish to speak privately with the RTB staff member, you can set up a time for the next day. We will be at SNA between 10:30 am and 12:30 pm. Make sure to bring any papers you have received from your landlord if you want to speak about a specific problem you are having (tenancy agreements, notices, rent receipts etc). We look forward to meeting tenants in the area and helping them with their questions and concerns.

Housing Update



Spence Neighbourhood Community Economic Development 5 Year Plan

What is Community Economic Development?

Community Economic Development (CED) relies on the knowledge and resources of local residents, businesses, and organizations to identify economic, social, cultural, and environmental needs of the community. CED plans can focus on topics such as:

- Pre-employment support
- Skills training
- Job searching
- Financial literacy education
- Buying locally
- Creating community-owned businesses

Why does Spence need a CED plan?

The Spence Neighbourhood Association (SNA) has been working on economic initiatives over the last ten years. We've had a number of successful projects in that time, such as the Skills Bank and I.D. programs, however, it became clear that the programming was not fully addressing the neighbourhood's economic development issues in a sustainable way.

Many of our community members are living in poverty; Spence has higher unemployment rates, and lower average income rates than the rest of Winnipeg. Opportunities for adequate employment and skills training, financial support programs, and self-employment are also in need. Local businesses would also benefit from skilled local workforce and strong community connections.

Therefore, SNA has decided to engage in Winnipeg's first community-led CED plan to address these issues, mindfully direct CED priorities, and promote a healthy, stable, and vibrant economy in the Spence neighbourhood over the long-term.

How will the CED plan be made?

SNA will be engaging the community to hear their opinions and ideas regarding CED. Using this information, the plan will outline tangible goals and programming aimed at creating a healthy and sustainable local economy.

April - May 2016: Community Engagements

SNA will engage youth, residents, businesses, and local organizations to hear their stories and ideas through surveys, focus groups, and consultations.

June 2016: Ellice Street Festival CED Community Booth

Come by to fill out a survey and see what others have been saying about CED in the neighbourhood. Enter to win awesome prizes from local businesses and programs.

July - August 2016: Creating the Plan

Working with the CED Committee, the plan will be written according to the input and directions outlined by the community.

September 2016 onwards: Implementing the Plan

The plan will be implemented by SNA and partners.

The CED plan will play a vital role in improving the health and sustainability of the Spence neighbourhood, and we'd love to involve as many community members as we can.

Youth Program

For the past four months of Youth Program, the youth team has implemented a points system to value participants' good behaviour. Youth receive points for helping cook, helping clean the kitchen and recreation centre, attending workshops, and participating in Homework Club. In return for reaching a set points goal, participants receive a prize they share as a group. As a group, they choose their own prize and set a point goal that is fair to match the prize.

For their March points goal, the youth aimed for 30 000 points, which was twice the amount they have ever reached in the past! Our youth surpassed that goal by several thousand points, so we celebrated on a Sunday at Sky Zone. Fifteen youth crammed into SNA's two community vans to head to the trampoline park, where we jumped and flipped and played dodge ball for two fun-filled and sweaty hours! We worked up quite an appetite, so we had a little pizza party after we arrived back at the MERC.

At the next Youth Advisory Committee Meeting at the end of April/beginning of May, youth attendees will decide their next point's goal and prizes to work towards!

Rooming House Assistance Program Accepting Applications!!

Rooming houses play an important role in the Spence neighbourhood and often represent the only housing option low-income individuals can afford. Many houses are in poor condition, and require significant repair. We are pleased to offer our assistance in a current grant opportunity that can financially assist in repairs. The Rooming House Assistance Program provides financial assistance to private owners of rooming houses in Manitoba to repair or rehabilitate their property. Repairs will bring these houses up to a **minimum level of safety** for the tenants and may also **improve liveability**.

Eligible applicants:

- Are private owners and unsubsidized private non-profit corporations and cooperatives owning rooming house that serve as permanent housing for the occupant.
- Eligible properties:
- Property must be a minimum of five years old,

- Must contain four or more rentable bed units,
- Property requires major repairs or be lacking in basic safety and health requirements,
- Rents must be at or below the Program Rental Limit for the area.
- Must have or be willing to have rents registered with the Residential Tenancies Branch and be or willing to be licensed with the City of Winnipeg.

Eligible repairs:

- Repairs that address basic safety, health, and/or structural as set out by the Manitoba Fire Code, and other deficiencies that put tenants at risk.
- Liveability repairs are eligible such as kitchens and bathrooms, but all other repairs are to be completed first.

Available amounts:

• The assistance is in the form of a 10-year forgivable loan and is based on the cost of repairs, number of eligible bed units within a project, and location of the property.
